Exhibition 'Recording Britain Now: Society' opens in London's Docklands

On 6 May, The John Ruskin Prize 2015/16 exhibition, *Recording Britain Now: Society*, will open at The Electrician's Gallery at Trinity Buoy Wharf in London's Docklands, accompanied by an event programme exploring current debates around regeneration in the capital.

Now in its third year, this open exhibition invited emerging and established artists from across the UK to respond to the theme, *Recording Britain Now: Society*. The artworks selected (from over 700 entries) for The 3rd John Ruskin Prize see artists reflect upon and address a diverse range of topics including housing, CCTV, identity, technology and the political climate.

In the same way that *Recording Britain* sought to map familiar townscapes and countryside under threat from World War Two and later from urban development, its contemporary counterpart *Recording Britain Now: Society*, was an invitation to artists across the UK to observe and record our country's society, which is in a constant state of transition.

The exhibition opened at the New Art Gallery Walsall in February, this year. Now, this London showing aims to open up dialogue with artists and the local community through a series of events exploring regeneration in the capital; featuring appearances by leading regeneration expert, Eric Reynolds, Megan Piper (Co-Founder, The Line Sculpture Trail) and finalists of The 3rd John Ruskin Prize, Jessie Brennan (2nd Prize winner), Hilary Powell and Myles Linley. Artist talk and open floor discussion, 'Regeneration: Who is it For', will take place on Thursday 19 May. While Drawing the Line will see The Big Draw & The Line partner for the ultimate sketch crawl on Saturday 21 May.

1. Exhibition - Recording Britain Now: Society

2. 'Regeneration: Who is it For'

This artist talk and open floor discussion will be led by finalists of The 3rd John Ruskin Prize, **Jessie Brennan** (2nd Prize winner) and **Hilary Powell**, on Thursday 19 May. **Eric Reynolds**, Founding Director of Urban Space Management, will join the panel for localised discussion on Trinity Buoy Wharf and Tower Hamlets.

Both Jessie Brennan and Hilary Powell conduct first hand research and produce work with communities in response to rapid urban regeneration, most recently, in East London. Jessie Brennan will open discussions based on her research on Robin Hood Gardens in Poplar, which resulted in her prize-winning artworks. There will also be a screening of Hilary Powell's A-Z of The Lea Valley in the making, which offers a comprehensive review of the history of The Lea Valley's rapid stages of transition over the years. http://www.thebigdraw.org/regeneration-who-is-it-for

3. Drawing the Line

This event will see The Big Draw & The Line partner for the ultimate sketch crawl on Saturday 21 May. Beginning with a tour and urban sketch crawl of *The Line* along the Greenwich Peninsula (12 - 2pm), and followed by a tour of The 3rd John Ruskin Prize exhibition - *Recording Britain Now: Society,* with complimentary refreshments (3 - 5pm). It also includes a visit and introduction to *Longplayer* housed with London's only lighthouse.

With artwork introductions by **Megan Piper** (Co-Founder, The Line Sculpture Trail) and drawing tutorial with 3rd John Ruskin Prize finalist **Myles Linley** this is billed as "an exciting

opportunity for sculpture lovers, urban explorers and people looking for a unique day out in one of London's most exciting creative quarters". www.thebigdraw.org/drawing-the-line

4. The John Ruskin Prize

In 2012, **The Guild of St. George** renewed its links with the Campaign for Drawing (now The Big Draw) to inaugurate **The John Ruskin Prize** - open to all artists over 18 working in the UK. The Prize allows us to promote and give exposure to the work of emerging artists using a wide range of media and techniques. It aims to uphold Ruskin's belief that drawing helps us see the world more clearly – its fragility as much as its beauty and magnificence. The winning artist is awarded a cash prize to help further their practice and all shortlisted artists are offered a place in an exhibition at a high profile public gallery.

The first John Ruskin Prize exhibition, *A New Look at Nature*, was successfully shown in Brantwood, Ruskin's former Lake District home. The second, *Recording Britain Now*, was shown in Sheffield's Millennium Gallery for five months, accompanying the V&A tour of *Recording Britain*. In November 2014, it had a second showing at London's Trinity Buoy Wharf, now the home of The Big Draw.

5. The John Ruskin Prize 2015/16

The 2015 prize encouraged artists to respond to the theme, *Recording Britain Now: Society*, by focusing on prevalent contemporary social issues. Similar to the way that, 75 years ago, *Recording Britain* mapped familiar townscapes and countryside under threat, this was an invitation to engage with a society in rapid transition, and offered today's artists the opportunity to join the ranks of well-known earlier commentators on the state of the nation.

This year, with support from The Guild of St. George and The Pilgrim Trust, The John Ruskin Prize award totaled £8,000. The winner, **Laura Oldfield Ford**, received £5,000, runner-up, **Jessie Brennan**, £2,000, and the new £1,000 student prize was awarded to **Robin Sukatorn**.

Draw was launched in 2000, by The Guild of St George, the charity founded by John Ruskin in 1871, becoming an independent arts education charity in 2006.
